



Are you living with HIV and have moved from your home country to live in Sweden?

- We are looking for individuals who would like to participate in an interview study on what it is like to live with HIV in Sweden. The purpose of the study is to investigate the experiences of people living with HIV who moved from their home countries to settle/live in Sweden. The interview will include questions about challenges in everyday life in relation to HIV and experiences of support and care in Sweden.
- We are looking for people throughout Sweden who live here. The interview can be conducted either face-to-face via telephone or video and will last between 30- 90 minutes. It is possible to be interviewed in Swedish, French, Swahili, Lingala or English or to be assisted by an interpreter of other languages.
- To be able to participate in the study, you must be:
 - 1) Migrant (you have moved from your home country to live in Sweden)
 - 2) 18 years or older
 - 3) Living with HIV
